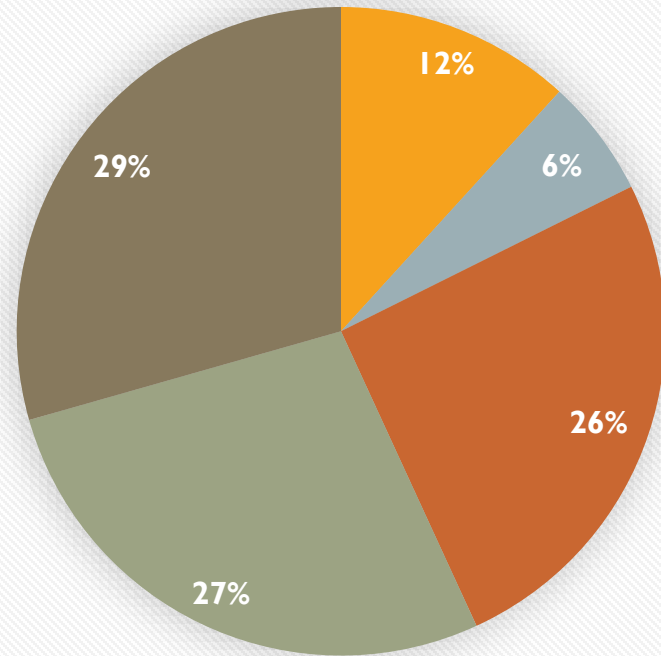

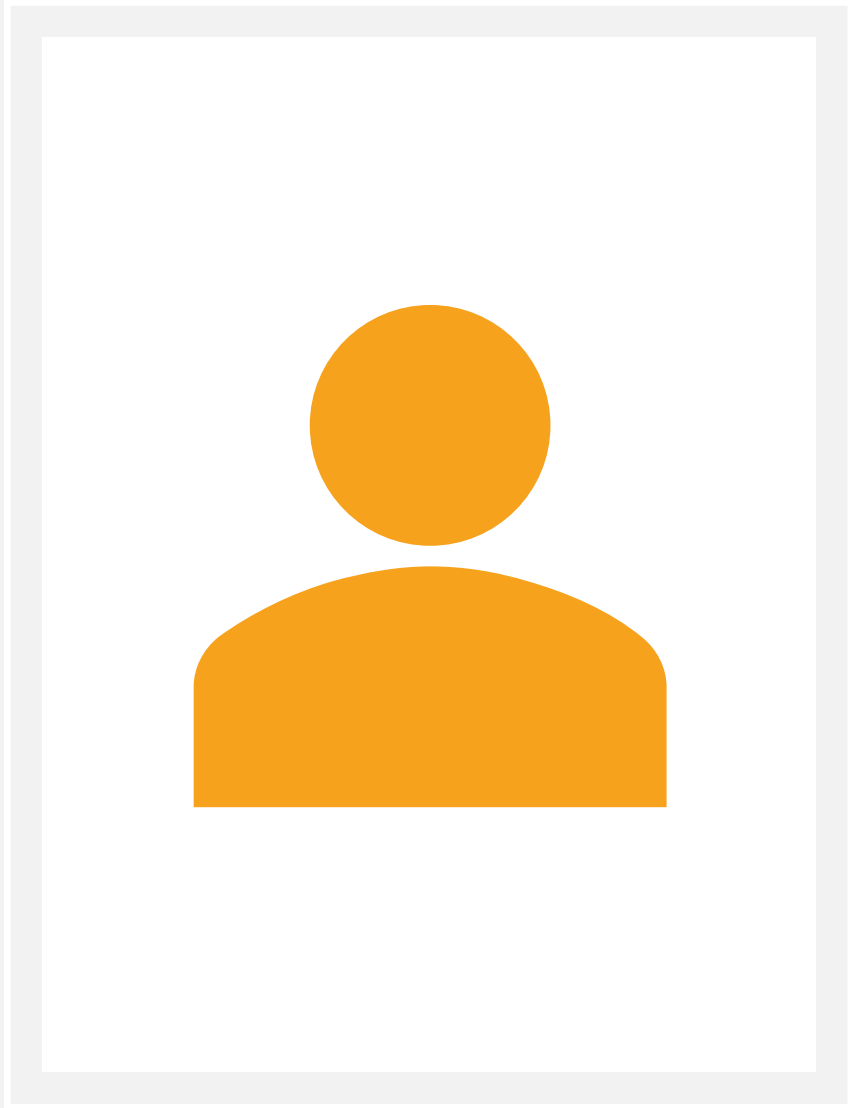

■ Southeast ■ Southwest ■ Central ■ Northeast ■ Northwest



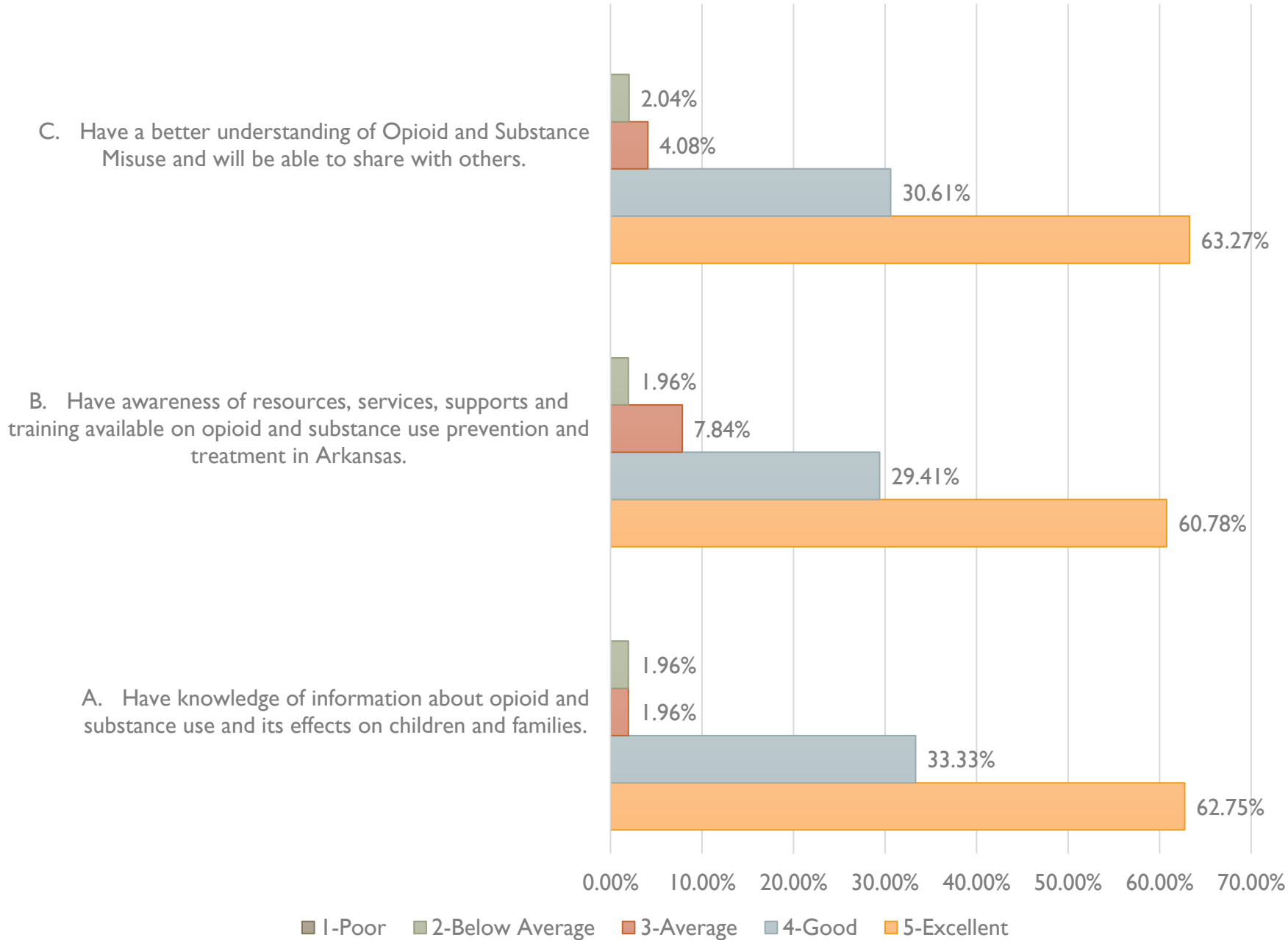

- Use strength-based teaching and assessments.
- Contact and refer to substance abuse facility.
- Treat addicts with more respect and empathy.
- Try to find more suitable resources.
- Networking. I will have a different approach.
- Be more aware. I will look into broadening my knowledge and support for those affected.
- Pay more attention.
- Reach out to the resources needed.
- Advocacy. Support and help those in need.
- Follow up and be present. We can be SO MUCH MORE!
- Listen to the person and help with the information from today. Active listening without judgement. Be more observant.
- Share it with family members. Be the difference in someone's life. Think before answer. Be more mindful of others. Keep an open mind. Reach out for the resources for my families.
- Look for FASD instead of assuming Autism. FASD-learned so much more than I already knew-very good!
- Having patience in understanding parents.
- Having faith not doubt.
